








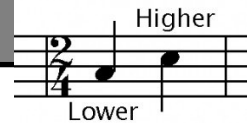


★ Developed further from Year 5

★ <u>Dynamics</u>		How loud or quiet a sound is
★ <u>Rhythm</u>		A strong pattern of movement or sound. They can be fast or slow and fit over the pulse
★ <u>Pulse</u>		Like a steady heartbeat
★ <u>Ostinato</u>		A repeated musical phrase or rhythm
★ <u>Timbre</u>		The unique sound of an instrument or sound
★ <u>Texture</u>		How layers of sound work with each within a piece of music
★ <u>Tempo</u>		The speed at which a piece of music is played



<p>★ <u>Structure</u></p>		<p>The order that different parts of the song are played in.</p>
<p><u>Crotchet</u></p>		<p>A musical note with the time value of one beat</p>
<p><u>Minim</u></p>		<p>A musical note with the time value of two beats</p>
<p><u>Quaver</u></p>		<p>A musical note with the time value of half a beat</p>
<p><u>Semibreve</u></p>		<p>A musical note with the time value of four beats</p>
<p>★ <u>Duration</u></p>		<p>How long something lasts</p>








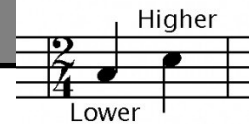
<p>★ <u>Pulse</u></p>		<p>Like a steady heartbeat, also known as the beat.</p>
<p>★ <u>Tempo</u></p>		<p>The speed at which a piece of music is played</p>
<p><u>Harmony</u></p>	<p>“ Harmony is when two or more notes are played at the same time. —</p>	<p>The sound of two or more notes played simultaneously</p>
<p><u>Chord</u></p>		<p>A group of notes which sound at the same time</p>
<p><u>Interval</u></p>	<p>Interval: The distance or difference between two notes, measured in semitones</p>	<p>The difference in pitch between 2 sounds</p>
<p><u>Melodic Phrase</u></p>		<p>A 'musical sentence' created by a series of notes which sounds complete even when played alone</p>



<p><u>Minimalistic Music</u></p>	<p>What is Minimalism</p> <p>in Music?</p> <hr/>	<p>Music that has limited or minimal musical materials or ideas featuring lots of repetition</p>
<p><u>Motif</u></p>		<p>A short musical 'idea' representing a mood or character in a piece of music</p>
<p>★ <u>Ostinato</u></p>		<p>The speed at which a piece of music is played</p>
<p>★ <u>Pitch</u></p>		<p>How high or low a note is.</p>
<p>★ <u>Rhythm</u></p>		<p>The pattern of syllables or sounds played through time, formed by a series of notes.</p>



<p><u>Tone</u></p>		<p>A musical or vocal sound characterised by its pitch, quality, and strength.</p>
<p><u>Semitone</u></p>	 <p>Piano-KeyBoard-Guide.com</p>	<p>Half a <u>tone</u> (the smallest interval in Western Classical music)</p>
<p><u>Scale</u></p>		<p>An ordered sequence of notes in either ascending or descending order</p>
<p>★ <u>Texture</u></p>		<p>The way that <u>pitch</u> and rhythm are combined in a piece of music which determines the overall quality of the sound.</p>
<p>★ <u>Timbre</u></p>	<p>Timbre Example - Flute and Oboe</p>  <p>2 Distinctive Sounds</p>	<p>The quality or 'colour' of sound that makes one voice or instrument different from another.</p>

<p>Pitched</p>		<p>An instrument able to play notes of different pitch</p>
<p>unpitched</p>		<p>An instrument unable to play notes of different pitch</p>
<p>Pentatonic scale</p>		<p>A five note musical scale</p>
<p>Repetition</p>		<p>A sound or phrase that is repeated</p>
